Apprenticeships Suffolk is a support service offering impartial information, advice, and guidance on the apprenticeship pathway.



We offer support to anyone 16+ who:
Wants to know more about the apprenticeship pathway.
Exploring a potential new career route via an apprenticeship.
Interested in getting an apprenticeship to gain an industry relevant qualification.
Working with an employer who wants to offer an apprenticeship to you but requires further support on next steps.

Apprenticeships Suffolk offer support to employers and aspiring apprentices at all stages; from finding an apprenticeship, enrolment support, starting your apprenticeship and throughout the whole journey.

What is an Apprenticeship?

Apprenticeships combine practical **work based training** with the opportunity to gain qualifications targeted towards a specific job role or industry. As an apprentice, you will be paid to do a **full-time job**, whilst gaining **industry specific knowledge, skills, and behaviours**, which count towards a **nationally recognised qualification**.

An apprenticeship includes:

- Paid employment with annual leave
- Working alongside experienced staff
- Gaining job-specific skills



• Time for training and study relevant to your job role, which amounts to a minimum of 6 hour per week, during your normal working hours. This is known as 'off the job' training.

Apprenticeships start from a level 2, which is equivalent to GCSE level and advance all the way up to a Level 7 which is equivalent to a masters degree. The level you start at will depend on your previous qualifications, knowledge and experience in that sector. Read on for more information on apprenticeship levels.

What is Off-the-job training?

Off-the-job training is learning, which is undertaken outside of your day-to-day work duties, and supports the achievement of your apprenticeship. This training takes place within your normal (contracted) working hours.

All apprentices must spend a minimum of **6 hours per week** doing off-the-job training, for the purpose of achieving the knowledge, skills and behaviours set out in the approved apprenticeship standard (read on to the types of apprenticeships page for more info)





Off-the-job training can be flexible and doesn't have to mean one day out of the workplace every week. For example, training could take place:

- Online
- In the workplace
- At a College, University or Training Centre
- Or it could be a combination of the above

Off-the-job training



The frequency of offthe-job training can vary from one day a week to part of a working day. Sometimes training is delivered in blocks of time which is also known as block release.

There are a range of activities that will contribute towards your off-the-job training including (but not limited to):

- Attendance at workshops, training days and webinars relevant to the apprenticeship
- Self-study that includes reading or watching videos
- Training in new working practices or new equipment
- Role-playing or simulation exercises
- Industry visits/conferences relevant to apprenticeships
- Assessments, assignments and completing projects
- Practical training or training in the workplace relevant to the apprenticeship

Who can do an apprenticeship?



Whether you are a school leaver or an experienced professional looking to upskill or change career, an apprenticeship could be the right next step to help you achieve your career goal!

You can start an apprenticeship at the level best suited to your stage of learning, the job you are applying for, and the apprenticeship standard that the employer is offering. The apprenticeship vacancy or job description will detail the entry requirements for the role.

You will however, need to achieve a pass in your Maths and English qualifications at GCSE or Functional skills level, before completion of your apprenticeship. (Read on to the functional skills page for more information)

There is <u>no upper age</u> <u>limit</u> on who can do an apprenticeship, you just need to be:

Inclusive Apprenticeships

Inclusive Apprenticeships





Apprenticeships Suffolk are working with local employers to raise awareness of inclusive apprenticeships and to create opportunities for the SEND community. Look out for our inclusive apprenticeships pin badge which highlights the inclusive opportunities!

Also look out for employers who are displaying the disability confident logo. The disability confidence scheme is creating a movement of change, encouraging employers to think differently about disability and take action to improve how they recruit, retain and develop disabled people.



Entry requirements can be lowered to an Entry Level 3 Functional Skill qualifications in Maths and English (unless exempt).

Entry Requirements

Apprenticeship employers will set their own entry requirements, but typically employers will be looking for at least 3-5 GCSEs (or equivalent), particularly in English and Maths. The entry requirements will vary depending on the level and type of apprenticeship you are applying for.

Apprenticeship Levels

Different apprenticeship levels have equivalent educational levels.

| Level | Level of Apprenticeship | Equivalent Education Level |
|--------------|-------------------------|----------------------------------|
| Intermediate | 2 | GCSE |
| Advanced | 3 | A-Level |
| Higher | 4, 5, 6 & 7 | Foundation degree and above |
| Degree | 6 & 7 | Bachelor's or Master's degree |

English and Maths

English and Maths are an essential component of all apprenticeship standards, therefore if you have not achieved a grade C or above (grade 4-9 from 2017), then you may choose to do a functional skills qualification instead of resitting your GCSE's. Functional skills are qualifications taught to post 16 and adult learners which apply Maths and English in real world contexts. You may be able to study functional skills alongside your apprenticeship programme (subject to conditions set by your training provider following an initial assessment).

English and Maths -Functional skills

People who start a Level 2 apprenticeship without Level 1 English and maths will no longer need to automatically attempt Level 2 English and Maths tests to complete their apprenticeship.

For individuals with special educational needs, learning difficulties or disabilities, who struggle to achieve the English and/ or Maths requirements due to the nature of their difficulty or disability, an entry level 3 functional skills qualification will be accepted for an intermediate apprenticeship.


Don't know what career is for you?



Did you Know?

There are more than 600 apprenticeship standards to choose from!*

An apprenticeship standard, sets out what the apprenticeship will look like for a specific role. They give you an overview of the apprenticeship, including information such as the level, duration, entry requirements and a list of knowledge, skills, and behaviours which you will be taught throughout your apprenticeship journey.

Apprenticeship Wage

How much you earn will depend on the industry, location, and level of apprenticeship you choose, however **national minimum wage for an apprentice is currently £4.81 per hour** (correct as of April 2022). An employer may choose to pay more than this.

If you are aged 19+, in the second year of your apprenticeship, your wage will increase in line with national minimum/ national living wage for your age.



There are <u>no</u> student loans or tuition fees to worry about as apprenticeships are funded by the Government and your employer.

If you are a **care leaver, aged 16-24**, you can also apply for a **£1000 bursary payment** to support you in the first year of your apprenticeship. For more details visit:


